RE: NAACP 1988 Membership Radiothon

The promises to be one of the most exciting and productive years in the history of the Association.

We are going to have a national memberhsip radiothon, the first in the Association's history, in September 1988. Thie radiothon comes as a result of a recommendation made by Dr. William F. Gibson, chairman of our National Board of Directors. This radiothon should serve to enhance the Association's visibility and to increase our membership nationally

Earlier this year, the Honorable Percy Sutton and Bishop Richard Allen Hildebrand accepted appointments as Chairman and Co-chairman, respectively, of the 1988 Membership Radiothon. Mr. Sutton is the 72nd Spingarn Medalist, a long-time civil rights activist, and a member of the SCF Board of Trustees. Bishop Richard Allen Hildebrand is a member of the National Board and long-time NAACP leader.

Our Atlanta and South Carolina Branches have conducted very successful radiothons; so, we know first-hand that radiothons can work. Additionally, a number of branches throughout the nation have also conducted radiothons. Ms. Jondell Johnson, former Executive Secretary of the Atlanta Branch, has been retained to head up the 1988 membership radiothon at the staff level. Promotional materials, public service announcements, posters, etc., are now in the process of being developed. It is our hope that hundreds, or possibly thousands, of radio stations will participate, along with a number of celebrities from all walks of life.

Shortly, you will receive a comprehensive package of information setting forth the parameters and expectations we have of you as a branch/youth/state conference leader. The date for the radiothon is Sturday, September 24. All branches are being asked to participate enthusiastically

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Transplant Consortium is a group of six area hospitals-Georgetown, George Washington, Childrens, Washington Hospital Center, and Fairfax (Va.), in addition to Howard. These hospitals had been forced by the District Planning Agency, alarmed over spiraling health care costs, to join forces to improve medical proficiency and thus lower costs. Howard University Hospital Administartor Rice is corsortium chairman. Under a federal act in the mid-70s, state planning agencies were formed. Many states have since abandoned these agencies. The District of Columbia however has maintained this agency. Both Rice and Dr. Callender credit it with area hospitals' ability to perform organ transplant operations on patients regardless of ability to pay. "In many other parts of America." Dr. Callender added, "if you are poor and have liver or heart trouble that requires transplantation, most often you were going to die." In kidney transplants, the government pays through medicare. But until about five years ago, it refused to pay for extra-renal (transplantation of organs other than the kidney) transplants.

In 1984, Dr. Callender was appointed to the National Task Force on Organ Transplantation, its only Black member. The Task Force was headed by Olga Jonasson. It considered a number of issues confronting organ transplantation; persons who need transplants other than kidneys, how to make the system equitable, and, since it made indiscriminate re- past

quests for organ donors, pay for all organ transplantation. 'We felt very strongly that liver and heart transplants were no longer experimental," said Dr. Callender, 'and should be recovered.'

The Task Force made this recommendation.

Howard Unviersity Hospital expects to do about 10 liver transplants the first year.
