LAS VEGAS, NV — President Reagan has declared Oct. 2-8, 1988 as Minority Enterprise Development Week (MED Week), a time set aside each year to salute the accomplishments of minority entrepreneurs and both private sector and public agencies which have contributed to the success of the minority business enterprise community.

The Nevada Economic Development Company (NEDCO), in conjunction with the Small Business Administration, announces three events planned to celebrate MED Week locally.

On Tuesday, Oct. 5, a MED Week Kick-Off Breakfast is scheduled at Chez Pollee Cafe, 2301 W.
