HUNDREDS OF ALPHAMEN REAFFIRM DR. KING'S DREAM AT 25TH ANNIVERSARY OF HISTORIC MARCH ON WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Several hundred members of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity reaffirmed the dream of their fallen brother, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., at last week's 25th anniversary observance of the historic March on Washington.

The Alphamen were easily noticed as they followed two national banners, carried by national and regional officers, and a number of Washington area chapter banners. Many members wore the organization's traditional black and gold colors.

In addition to national and regional officers, Washington area Alpha officials and members at large from the Eastern, Midwestern, and Southern Regions marched behind the colorful banners. Other members carried black and gold placards which read: "Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity Reaffirms the Dream" and "Alpha Phi Alpha Fra-

ternity Says End Apartheid Now."

"The life and legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., must be remembered not only by his Alpha brothers but by all Americans of goodwill," declared Charles C. Teamer, Sr., general president. Teamer, who hails from New Orleans, added: "We must continue to press for action to make good the promissory note described by Brother King in his famous 'I Have A Dream' speech of 25 years ago."

Teamer indicated his satisfaction with the large turnout of Alpha brothers despite the 90 degree temperature. The group stood out as the largest single delegation in the crowd some estimated at 55,000. However, other observers who have seen many marches on the mall put the figure at nearly 75,000.

The initial gathering of Alpha members was joined by many others after the group assembled near 14th Street and Constitution Avenue Northwest. In fact, the delegation grew as the march developed. Many young men, still in college, were part of the throng.

- Teamer observed that Alpha Phi Alpha was established by seven young black college men at Cornell University in Ithaca, N.Y. The fraternity is the oldest predominantly black Greekletter organization in the nation, founded in 1906.

LeRoy Lowery, III, president of Washington's Mu Lambda Chapter, served as area coordiantor for the march. He is the son of the Rev. Joseph Lowery of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference. The elder Lowery was one of the principal speakers at the observance.

Other speakers included the Rev. Jesse L. Jackson; Mrs. Coretta Scott King, widow of the civil rights leader; Benjamin Hooks, executive director of the NAACP; Democratic presidential candidate Michael S. Dukakis; Republican Senator Lowell P. Weicker, Jr. of Connecticut; Atlanta Mayor Andrew Young, longtime associate of Dr. King; and Pr resentative Charles B. Rangel (D-N.Y.). Both Young and Rangel are members of the fraternity.

Comedian-activist Dick Gregory, also an Alphaman, served as master of ceremonies. He was joined by comedienne-actress Whoopi Goldberg.

Red Cross officials said no serious injuries were reported. However, several persons were taken to local hopsitals with heat exhaustion after standing for hours in the hot weather.

A reception for cooling off was held for the Alpha participants at a Washington hotel after the march ended.
