

When I first drafted this column, I was jokingly tempted to call it "Fifty-one doesn't equal a full deck'' because as of this season, there are now 51 Black head coaches in Division I basketball.

This select group, many coaching at HBI's, is compiling impressive credentials that show the scope of skills and abilities that African professionals possess when given chances.

Coach John Thompson of Georgetown University is the most widely known. He led the Hoyas to the 1983-84 championship and has made the school perennial winners in the Big East.

Most recently, Big John led the U.S. basketball team to victory in the Olympics (bronze medal).

But Big John has been both praised and criticized by the sports media. Yet, in 18 years at Georgetown, very few of his players have failed to graduate. How many other colleges can make that statement?

His players have been called gangsters and undisciplined, yet when white ball players get physical, they are praised for going all out. How many times have we heard Packer, McGuire or Musburger (just to mention a, few) talk about this player or that player having spunk, spirit and savy?

One could almost hear a collective sigh around America when the Georgetown monster didn't repeat as national champions the next year, a feat that hasn't been done since UCLA and John Wooden. Whenever Mr. Thompson loses, he becomes a great guy again.

Speaking of UCLA, it was probably the first predominantly white major Division I school to hire back-to-back African coaches. Larry Farmer was first and then Walt Hazzard.

Of the seven colleges that I have directly been a part of (either as a student or professional), only two schools did not have at least one Black assistant coach. One school at the time didn't have a basketball team and the other had an "unofficial" assistant coach who by profession served as a full-time history professor.

This pattern of having at least one Black assistant coach is consistent across the country. With so many coaching positions, it would seem sort of natural that as openings occurred, these assistants would be considered.

It is so positive to see that a group of proactive and progressive Black assistant coaches have now formed an organization that as designed should place them in real positions to be considered when head coaching positions become open.

The Black Coaches Association is just what the doctor ordered. This group has also stated that it is committed to academic support for athletes.

Hiring more Black coaches is not the panacea to academic excellence; however, there appears to be a direct positive bond shared by them and Black athletes.

AS AN ASIDE, think back to that Georgetown championship season. Was I the only person to notice that of the starting centers on the final four teams, three were Black and from other countries? Jamaica, Nigeria and Haiti were well represented, wouldn't you say? My biggest hope is that a new era of Black international exploitation isn't beginning. This should be the third charge of BCA and the 51 African head coaches.

Fortunately, it is one that can be stopped in our lifetime. We must challenge our young people to choose a lifestyle which does not include drinking and driving. MADD's chapters, which

number nearly 400, schools and other youth-oriented organizations are encouraged to conduct local contests and forward their first place winning entries to MADD's national office in Hurst, Texas for judging. For the first time, essays and posters will be accepted in English and Spanish in equal competition for first, second or third place. All entries must be postmarked by February 13, 1989

The poster contest is open to four grade divisions: grades 1-3, 4-6, 7-9 and 10-12. First, second and third place winners are selected from each division.

The essay contest is open to three divisions: grades 4-6, 7-9 and 10-12. Again, the top three winners are chosen from each division.

Each of the seven firstplace national winners will receive a check for \$1,000 to be presented at an awards ceremony in New York City on Tuesday, April 4, 1989. Second and third place winners will each receive a check for \$500 and \$250 respectively. Both the New York City trip and the cash awards are provided by National Car Rental.
