I came across a book titled "What They Said in 1972" and immediately noticed that Black leaders were once again center stage on numerous global issues. Some names and events are more familiar than others, but you should score pretty well with this who's who list.

It is not my purpose to conduct a comparative study (where they stood in 1972, compared to 1989) of the following people, particularly those still with us.

These people and quotes are not meant to be all inclusive. Their positions in 1972 follow their names.

DICK ALLEN (baseball player). They write that I'm not a team player, that I force managers to have two sets of rules. Well, I didn't ask them to make two sets of rules. Maybe the problem is their rules (from the LA Times)

IGNATIUS K. ACHEAM-PONG (Chief of State of Ghana). Total emancipation of Africa from colonial domination will continue to be a cardinal principle of Ghana's foreign policy. (The Washington Post)

FORBES BURNHAM (Prime Minister of Guyana). The independent English-speaking Caribbean states will seek the early establishment of

relations with Cuba, whether economic or political or both. (The Washington Post)

FIDEL CASTRO (Premier of Cuba). We have never thought about talking to (U.S. President) Nixon about anything. What have we got to tell him? That he stops being an imperialist? That he raises the blockade of Cuba? That he stops being an aggressor? (The LA Herald-Examiner)

JESSE JACKSON (President, Operation PUSH). Without the option of a Black political party, we (Black people) are doomed to remain in the hip pocket of the Democratic party and the rumble seat of the Republican party. (The San Francisco Examiner & Chronicle)

MICHAEL MANLEY (Prime Minister of Jamaica). The continuing inability of the United Nations to mediate situations of international crisis and reduce the inequalities between nations does not reflect any lack of desire or skill among the start of this organization or its various agencies. (addressing the UN General Assembly, Vital Speeches)

JULIUS K. NYERERE (President of Tanzania). (On Uganda President Idi Amin's decision to expel Uganda citizens who are Asian): This is clearly racialism and representative of the same thing that Africans are deploing. (LA Times)

MUAMMAR QADDAFI (Premier of Libya). We stand today with 25 million Black Americans. We stand with 5

The class is an introduction to microorganisms and methods to control them. Participants will become familiar with the terms of microbiology and culturing procedures, learn to identify bacteria, and relate microbiology to cleaning procedures.

Effective Communication Course Scheduled by CCCC

A three part workshop on communicating with staff and customers entitled *Effective Communication — Your Lifeline to Success* is scheduled February 7, 14, 21, 6:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. at Nevada National Bank, 2300 W. Sahara in the 2nd floor Board Room. The workshop is part of the Success Program, a management training series for business owners and managers, presented by the Center for Business and Industry Training, Clark County Community College.

Customer Service on February 7 will cover direct client contact, sales and service, dealing with difficult customers, and the tracking of customer service. *Oral Communications* on February 14 will focus on the most used and misused form of business communication, and will include telephone skills. *Written Communications* on February 21 will address the English skills needed by business owners and managers to prepare reports, proposals, memos, letters and more.

Each of the sessions is self-contained but attendance at all three is recommended to maximize the benefits of effective and appropriate communication. Pre-registration is required with a fee of \$35 for each session or \$90 for the entire

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
