#### Curveballs

I think there were once those who tried to claim curveballs didn't really curve but were optical illusions. As a player who watched thousands of them coming toward the plate. I can tell you they really bend. They start out going in one direction and curve over to a different point. Where the ball begins to curve is the spot players say the ball "breaks."

But there is not just one pitch called a curveball. There are many different types. Some curves break very, very big. Some break very late, that is, close to the plate. Some are called "lazy curveballs," which are the opposite of the ones that have good snap to them.

One pitcher who threw curves with a good snap was Sandy Koufax. He was more famous for his fastball, but he developed a very good curve and struck out a lot of batters with it. He threw so hard that his curve was more of an "obstacle illusion" than an optical illusion.

But Koufax didn't have the best curveball on the Dodgers' pitching staff, or even the second best. They had two of the best curveball pitchers I ever faced in Carl Erskine and Johnny Podres.

The player who had the best curve I ever saw was Sam Jones, who played for the St. Louis Cardinals, the Chicago Cubs and the San Francisco Giants. "Sad" Sam Jones was so tough because he could throw the curve all kinds of ways. Sidearm, overhead, Sam could throw the curve from all these different motions.

Now, many young pitchers come into professional baseball able to throw the curveball. But they don't have what we call a "controlled" curveball. Oh, they have a big curve that high school or college batters will swing at. But the higher they go in professional baseball, the more disciplined the hitters get. Pitchers have to have their pitches "under control." knowing where they are going to be when they get to the plate.

Instructors work with them to develop control. It's like most good tennis players have a "second serve." After their best hard serve hits the net or goes across the back line, they use a second serve that they know will stay in play.

Baseball pitchers get in situations where they have to get the ball over the plate for a strike, but they know the batter is sitting back waiting on a fastball. So they have to throw a breaking pitch for a strike. That's when a controlled curveball is like a tennis player's second serve.

You see, a breaking ball is not all that hard to throw, but it is hard to control. And it is a pitch that will get kids in trouble if they don't know how to control it. **lil**

Johnson batted over .300 in seven of the nine seasons in which the Negro Leagues kept statistics, retiring with a

lifetime average over .340. He played for the Philadelphia-based Hilldale Daisies for much of his career, finishing as player-manager of the Homestead Grays. His best season was 1925, when he batted .392.
