Such questions may be irrelevant to people who have to share apartments, stand in line for hours to buy a pair of shoes, or live in constant fear of the secret police.

But they are very relevant to Americans who truly want their nation and their society to be a flawless model for the rest of the world.

I take little satisfaction in the fact that my country has more freedom and a better economic system than do China, Poland and the U.S.S.R I think more of myself and of my country than to compare my society politically with and economically backward nations.

The real comparison should be with what American democracy ought to be; with how much better we can become, with how more we have to do to make our system work for each and every American.



ago," Molpus said. wish we could undo it. Every decent person in Philadelphia and Neshoba County feels that way.

The observance, in front of the Mount Zion Methodist Church were Chaney, Goodman and Schwerner had been conducting a black vote registration meeting the night they were killed, showed that "Mississippi and America are far different places than they were 25 years ago," Gov. Ray Mabus said.

After leaving the church, the three men were arrested on a traffic violation and taken to the Neshoba County Jail in Philadelphia, 60 miles northeast of Jackson.

They disappeared after being released and an FBI investigation concluded they were shot to death by members of the Ku Klux Klan. Their bodies were found 44 days later buried in an ear-

Schwerner, 24, and Goodman, 20, were white volunteers from the New York City area. Chaney was a 21-year-old black man from Meridian.

"A nation which forgets its martyrs has lost its soul,' Farmer said.

the other hand, "neither the White press nor the Black press has promoted alternatives," she added. "Certainly the Black press has not gone on record supporting initiatives that can and will make a difference for the African American family. This convention provides a forum for us to examine our role as the Black Press of America--as communicators to Black America -- as leaders locally and nationally."

She emphasized that "We're a different (and better) Black Press in 1989 than we were in 1981...but we can't rest on our laurels."

The convention featured a number of panel discussions and seminars including those on "Enhancing The Family Unit'' "Improving Educational Excellence and Equity'', ''Maintaining Your Health'', and ''Developing and Maintaining Family Housing'

Speakers included Dr. William A. Robinson, Director

HHS Office of Minority Health, pinch-hitting for his boss, HHS Secretary Louis Sullivan, and Dr. Orlando

Taylor, dean, Howard University School of Communications.

Dr. Robinson also cited the dreary minority health statistics--of life expectancy for Blacks declining from 69.5 to 69.4 years in stark contrast to the increase in the nation's overall longevity (from 74.7 to 74.8), and of spiralling infant mortality. This "Blacks are negatively affected at both life's dawn and life's dusk". He said the six primary causes of minority deaths as enunciated in HHS Task Force Report: cancer, cardiovascular disease and stroke, chemical dependency, measured by death from cirrhosis, diabetes, homicide and accident (unintentional injuries), infant mortality, must now be added suicide and AIDS
