Major Hotel Casinos--Is There Room At The Top For Blacks?

Because of the uniqueness of Nevada, the Nevada Gaming Control Board and the State Gaming Commission have envolved into regulatory agencies over the gaming industry which have virtual absolute power and authority. Traditionally, positions on the gaming boards have been a career ladder into top executive positions within the gaming industry.

Since gaming was established in Nevada, however, there has been only a single Black person, a certified public accountant, to be appointed to a position on the gaming board. Unfortunately, we will never know if he could have become the first Black chief hotel/casino executive, because he voluntarily resigned before his term expired.

can only Thus, we speculate what his chances would have been to become the first black head of a major strip hotel resort.

To be sure, a few Blacks have climbed the ladder of success within the gaming industry and have been elevated to middle management positions. Some even have "the power of the pen'' to sign comps and extend hotel privileges on their own authority. But, can it truly be said that any of these individuals are key employees? I think not.

With the passage of a 'cooling off' law in the 1987 Nevada Legislature, it will not be possible in the future for gaming board and commission members to become casino officers without waiting out for a specified period of time. So some of the advantages of

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having those positions have

been watered down for those serving in the future.

What it means is that if there is ever another Black appointee to a gaming board. he or she will have a trying time entering the gaming industry at a high level once their term expires. Of course those same restrictions would apply to all other members of the gaming board.

Fortunately, there are other avenues to corporate business power in Nevada gaming and the vast majority of our present corporate officers got there through some of these other means. One way is to gain direct control of a major source to finance buying a hotel-casino--such as the Teamster's Pension Fund

Another way is to work your way up the corporate ladder in a company based outside of Nevada, then to get appointed to transfer and head up a Nevada operation.

Yet another way is to become a legal consultant or financial consultant to major gaming business.

these Whichever of avenues you look at, it is clear that a Black person would find it difficult to penetrate the inner circle of the power elite to get a shot at


