# 'Blacks Face Racism From Without. **Deterioration From Within'--NAACP**

"Racism from without and deterioration from within' are the major problems facing Black America. NAACP President Bejamin L. Hooks declared following a three day conference on the "Present Crisis in our Society'' in the capital.

Approximately 300 representatives from religious, civil rights and community based national organizations attended the sessions on the black family, Black on Black crime; adult illiteracy, teenage pregnancy, unemployment, the homeless, racism, intragroup violence and "organizing the black com-munity to fight back," October 29-November 1.

Although the conference was designed as a follow-up to the NAACP's "Silent Marprotest here last ch'' August, Hooks said the current response was so great it indicated the need for 'unbrella group'' of black leaders to mobilize their communities.

Participants urged greater support and resources for

voter registration, increased participation in the 1990 U.S. Census count to provide more political empowerment, and development of a legislative agenda for the benefit of the "disadvantaged" people, the NAACP executive stated.

"The first thing we have to do is to get Congress to pass some laws reversing those terrible Supreme Court decisions'' limiting affirmtive action'' he emphasized. Several sessions were held on the "Crisis in the Courts''

"Also, we must begin to get our act together in our own communities to do something about drugs, crime and pregnancy," the NAACP leader declared in calling for a unified approach to the mounting problems. He referred conferees to the five-year old recommendations of the Black Family Summit conducted by the National Urban League and the NAACP in 1984.

Attention was focused on addressing the problems of the "so-called black underclass" at a major session on

"Where Are We and Where population Do We Go From Here" with panelists Dorothy Height, National Council of Negro Women: Rev. Joseph Lowery, Southern Christian Leadership Conference; Norman Hill, A Philip Randolph Institute; Julius Chamber, NAACP Legal Defense Fund, and Coretta Scott King.

At the closing plenary session, keynote speaker Jesse Jackson urged nationwide support of legislation to make the District of Columbia a State with two elected senators and voting members of Congress.



like other citizens, Jackson emphasized. He cited President George Bush's veto of the District budget because it included abortion rights as an example of DC not having equal authority to pass its own laws like other states.

Although seven states with heavy black populations are likely to increase the number of representatives elected to Congress in 1990 and eleven states are likely to lose representation, the total number of black members in the House of Representatives should increase according to Census projections an analysis of congressional redistricting indicated in a report to the conference.
