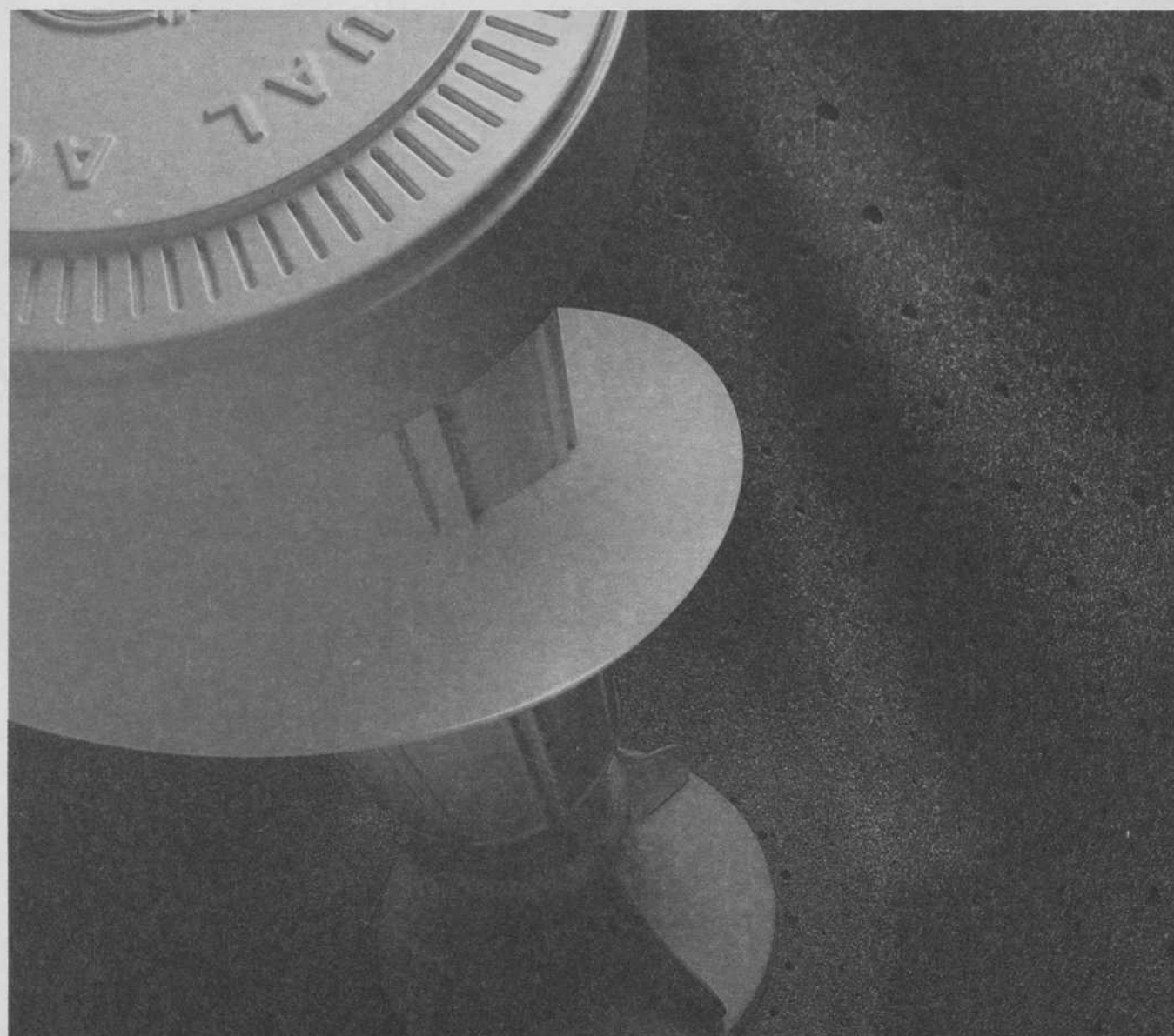
Progressive National Baptist Convention
