Diana Ross Stars At Caesasrs Palace

Diana Ross returns to the Circus Maximus Showroom spotlight at Caesars Place, starring in cocktail shows Jan. 24 -- Feb. 5 (dark 1/30).

Ross, one of the city's most popular headliners, recently completed her world tour, "Workin" Overtime," named for her 56th and latest album. It was her first tour since her marriage to Norwegian shipping magnate Arne Naess in 1985 and the subsequent birth of their two sons. She returns to Caesars after 15 sold-out dates in Australia and Japan.

She says she is pleased to be back performing live. "There is no place as exciting for me to be as up on a stage performing for an audience. It's exhilarating not just because of the thrill of live performance, but because it really represents my total effort. I've worked on every aspect of the show, from songs to lighting, so a concert really lets me share all parts of myself with the audience."

With the Supremes, Ross scored gold and platinum singing such classics as "Why Do Fools Fall in Love," "Stop! In the Name of Love," "Reach Out and Touch (Somebody's Hand)," "Ain't No Mountain High Enough" and "Baby Love." The '80s have found Ross climbing the charts as a highly successful solo artist,

with Endless Love' (with Lionel Richie), ''Mirror, Mirror, '' 'Muscles,' ''Telephone,' ''All of You' (with Jukio Iglesias) and ''Eaten Alive.' Her career has brought accolades not only for hit records, but also for screen successes 'Lady Sings the Blues,' 'Mahogany' and ''The Wiz''
