Thirdly, we must revitalize one of the friendships our system of public health. Too many of the nation's public hospitals struggle in their role as providers of last resort. They need resources to update their medical equipment and recruit doctors, nurse and other key medical personnel. I plan to rise this issue in Congress and link the Congressional Black Caucus of which I am a member, and Congressional Rural Caucus to examine the national plight of community hospital and provide needed assistance.

> Finally, we must embark on a comprehensive mission to prepare our workforce for the year 2000. As mentioned previously, educational efforts in the early learning years (Head Start, Chapter 1), are critical to this mission However, determined efforts on all fronts will be necessary to meet this challenge. Last year, I introduced the Workforce 2000 Employment Readiness Act legislation intended to educate our workforce in basic skills and training for the new jobs being created technology Congressional hearings on this legislation will continue this year.

Undoubtedly, other national issues must be responded to, such as drug abuse, homelessness, public housing needs, the security of our senior citizens, infant mortality, and others. Above all, let us be wary of complacency. This nation has the know-how and the resources to overcome economic and social inequities. Let us begin the new decade with a caring and ambitious tone, and work to invest in the welfare of our fellow Americans.
