
to go to a Black independent school. Yet many everyday experiences can be used to help Black children appreciate our history. We can tell our children about Jan Matzelinger, whose invention of the lasting machine revolutionized the shoe industry, each time we take them to buy shoes. We can remind our children of Sarah Parker Remond, who developed an international reputation as an abolitionist and physician, each time they visit a doctor's office or medical clinic. Each time we cross the street, we can have our children remember Garret A. Morgan's invention of the red-yellow-green traffic signal.

There are many books available to help reinforce such basic history lessons. For less than the price of a pair of designer jeans or sneakers, a family can own the Dictionary of American Negro Biography, an invaluable resource edited by Rayford W. Logan and Michael Winston. From agriculturalists and aviators to cattle brokers and conservationists; from judges and pharmacists to scientists and women's rights advocates; all are included in this one handy Black reference guide. Younger children will enjoy picture book having biographies of Fannie Lou Hammer, Harriet Tubman, Frederick Douglass, Paul Robeson and others read to them. Older children will enjoy reading books like Eight Black American Inventors (by Robert C. Hayden) and

Present (by Russell L Admas) for themselves.

All of our children must learn, as the four year old children at Roots Activity Learning Center already have, that Black people can be anything and everything. The time to start is now.

Volunteer Tutors Wanted For Library's Literacy Program

The Las Vegas-Clark County Library District's computer assisted literacy in libraries (CALL) program needs volunteers to tutor non-reading adults on a oneto-one basis. Volunteers may call 798-5101 to sign up for the tutor training orientation which will be given January 8 at the West Las Vegas library, 951 W. Lake Mead Blvd., at 6 p.m.; and January 9 at 2 p.m. and 6 p.m. at the library in Rebel Center, 4550 So. Maryland Parkway.

CALL is a tutor-student learning program designed to help non-reading adults achieve a fifth grade literacy level. Volunteer tutors who would like to help teach adults how to read are given an orientation, and then enter a 15-hour training program with one workshop a week for five weeks.
