

The school district holds a genetic/diagnostic clinic monthly to evaluate children who are at risk for learning problems. The service is offered free to children and their families who are medically undiagnosed and have a variety of high-risk indicators that may suggest a genetic problem.

The goal of this genetic/diagnostic clinic, according to school nurse Renee Ball, is to determine if an underlying medical problem is contributing to a child's academic 10 behavioral problems. Ball also acts as coordinator for the clinic and is responsible for facilitating clinic referrals. The clinic, under the medical direction of Pediatric Geneticist Colleen

Ball said, "Due to the growing number of high risk children and medically fragile children, clinic openings are very limited. Because of time constraints only three students are evaluated at each clinic. All appointments for the genetic/diagnostic clinic are processed by the school nurse. Parents are encouraged to contact the school nurse at their child's school regarding any health concerns.

A scoliosis screening clinic is also offered free for children suspected of having a curvature of the spine. This clinic is under the medical direction of Orthopedic Surgeon John Thalgott, M.D.


