Although Fauntroy is a ranking member of several Congressional committees because of his seniority from ten elections, he still cannot vote on the floor of Congress because D.C. residents do not have full voting rights.

The minister-politician. who served as a key aide to Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., along with Reverend Jackson and Barry, says his election would heal the city by emphasizing four partnerships with (1) Congress and the President, (2) Labor. Business and Development interests, (3) Committed and Talented people he would recruit from other projects he has directed, and (4) current talented leadership in government, including employees of Mayor Barry, who have made great contributions to progress in the

## Pilot Lectures on 'Black Air Force' of WWII

"Not many people know about the history of the 'Black Air Force' of World War II," said John Steward Sloan, Sr., former fighter-pilot in the all-Black squadron, who earned the Purple Heart. He gave an informative lecture on the subject, March 13 at the West Las Vegas Library.

Sloan lectured on three aspects of the famous 99th Fighter Squadron of WWII. also known as the Black Air Force. First he discussed the historical and social setting which led to the creation of the special squadron.

Secondly, he discussed the Tuskegee Army Airfield of 1941, which he called the Black Air Force Academy. "Segregation was still with us," said Sloan. "We had to be trained in a 'separate but equal' situation." He also discussed why Tuskegee was chosen as the training center.

He focused on the cadet flying experience, the "nuts and bolts" of what this

special unit meant to the pilots and to the black community. He also related this historical experience to the contemporary situation, discussing how one leads to the other.

Becoming a member of the 99th Fighter Squadron himself in 1944 at the combat operational base in Naples, Italy, he qualified for Air Corps Cadet in 1941, volunteered for the draft in 1942, was sent to the Tuskegee training center in 1942 and was commissioned in 1943. Shot down by anti-aircraft during the Battle of Cassino in 1947, he was one of only eight Black WWII fighter pilots to be awarded the Purple Heart.

Sloan, born in Louisville, KY in 1918, received his B.A. degree in history and sociology from Kentucky State University, and accumulated graduate credits in psychology and industrial relations at Fisk University and the University of Chicago. A private pilot since 1962, he has been a salesman, an industrial relations consultant and a radio D.J. He authored a book on harness racing in 1975, "The Game Plan for Handicapping Harness Races."
