But Scanlon says its time for Congress to start removing barriers that stand in the way of building on the present success of tenant management.

For example, the Heritage analyst advocates eliminating the 1987 Housing and Community Development Act's requirement that one new public-housing unit be built or restored for each unit purchased by tenants. Because tenant managers rehabilitate empty units in projects where they take over and often invest in the construction of new affordable housing. Scanlon says this requirement is not necessary. Furthermore. there are presently 100,000 vacant public housing units.

Scanlon says HUD could reallocate \$250 million in 1991 to HOPE, if Congress would eliminate the "one for replacement one'' requirement in the housing law

Tenant management and ownership could also be encouraged, according to

Scanlon, by setting a "fair market value" rent ceiling, as proposed by Sen. Dan Coats (R-Ind.), instead of the present policy of assessing all tenants 30 percent of their income in rent. The Heritage analyst says it would allow families whose income has risen above the poverty level to remain in their tenant-managed housing, serving as role models and reinvesting in their community. At the same time, he says, it would allow those families to save for

homes Scanlon says that since provisions in the Davis-Bacon Act increase public housing construction and rehabilitation costs by nearly 25 percent, Congress should exempt tenant management from groups these requirements. The Davis-Bacon Act requires payment of inflated union wages on almost all federally assisted housing construction and







- 1442 First African slave brought to Lisbon, Portugal.
- 1492 Pedro Alonzo Nino, said by many scholars to have been a Negro, arrived with Columbus as one of his pilots, Oct. 12
- Our A-Team Winners for 1513 Balboa's expedition to the Pacific included thirty Blacks who were instrumental in clearing the way between two oceans. April.
 - 1517 Bishop Las Casas influences the Spanish government to allow Spaniard to import twelve Negroes each to encourage immigration to the New World.
 - 1526 The first slave revolt took place in the first United States settlement which contained slaves--an area in present-day South Carolina. April 22.
 - Estevanico (Little Stephen), a Black explorer, led 1538 expedition from Mexico and discovered Arizona and New Mexico.
