LaSalle's Simmons Named AP Player of the Year


DENVER - Unlike some of his big bucks-conscious brethren. Lionel Simmons chose to return to college for his senior year.

The decision not only will be worth a degree this spring, but it helped Simthe Adolph Budd Trophy as The Associated Press college basketball player of the year

Simmons, a 6-foot-7 senior forward at La Salle whose 3,217 points are exceeded by only two other players in NCAA history, was presented the award Friday.



Middleweight Championship **Battle Set For Caesars** Palace April 29

Las Vegas, Nev. -- All-action fighter Doug DeWitt is set to defend his World Boxing Organization middleweight title on Sunday afternoon, April 29, when he faces British middleweight champion Nigel "The Dark Destroyer'' Benn in the Caesars Palace Sports Pavilion. The doubleheader boxing card also features a World Boxing Association light heavyweight title fight, with champion Virgil Hill, of Bismark, N.D., taking on Philadelphia's Tyrone
