Tarpley Cleared

DALLAS — Roy Tarpley has been cleared to rejoin the Dallas Mavericks after test results showed no evidence of drugs or alcohol in his system.

The test results, made available Monday, allow Tarpley to continue his NBA career after he was suspended last Friday for missing practice.

Tarpley, already two-time offender of the league's drug policy, faces a lifetime ban if he tests positive a third time.

"I feel real bad about this," Tarpley said in a statement issued by the Mavericks. "I need to work on being a responsible person. I should have been at practice. I should have called."

Tarpley told team officials

he overslept Friday and was too embarrassed to call the team. An assistant coach tracked him down at his house after a six-hour search.

Tarpley, the team's leading rebounder and third-leading scorer, was suspended in 1987 and again in 1989 in connection with drug use.

Wade Signs Contract

The Dallas Mavericks have signed Mark Wade, a guard from the Pensacola Tornados, to a 10-day contract while the injured Brad Davis recuperates.

Wade was to suit up for last Monday's game against the Los Angeles Lakers. Davis was put on the injured list Saturday after tearing tendons in his right knee during practice six days earlier April 2.

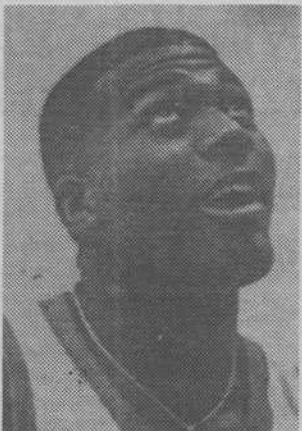
Wade, a former UNLV star, averaged 13.6 points per game in 56 games with Pensacola this season.
