Finally, many of the residents that I interviewed believed that it would be better to move away from the area. One resident said that Coaxum was a sincere officer and showed genuine concern for the tenants and that's why he was shot. An elderly white tenant said that she had two of her tires slashed because the drug traffickers thought she had snitched on them. She refused to release her name out of fear.

The solutions are not simple, but a few residents said they are tired of being silent and want to reclaim their community.

Other citizens, sensitive to the community in general, have started efforts to secure gainful employment for interested residents and have called the Sentinel-Voice reporter to offer their services.

One individual in particular

is Joseph Maviglia, President of H&E Training Schools, Inc., a non-profit organization that is seeking unemployed youth and adults who are "ready and willing" to learn a trade and go to work. Maviglia said that his organization is dedicated to helping anyone who is serious about working and will supply on-the-job training and help them get employment once they complete the training program.

1664 - Maryland passed a law preventing marriages between English women and Negroes; several of the colonies followed suit soon thereafter.

1671 - Maryland passed an Act declaring that conversion of slaves to Christianity did not affect their slave status.

1672 - The King of England chartered the Royal African Company which came to dominate the world slave trade.

1688 - Quakers of Germantown, Pennsylvania, made the first formal protest against slavery in the Western hemisphere on February 18.

1704 - Elias Nau, a Frenchman, opened the first school for Blacks in New York City.

1705 - Virginia enacted a law permitting owners to list people as property.

1712 - Early slave revolt occurred in New York City on April

Pennsylvania passed the first legislation to prevent the importation of slaves.

1713 - Anthony Benezet, a teacher of Blacks and leading abolitionist in Pennsylvania, was born.

1715 - Francisco Xavier de Luna Victoria was the first Black to become bishop in America (in Panama).

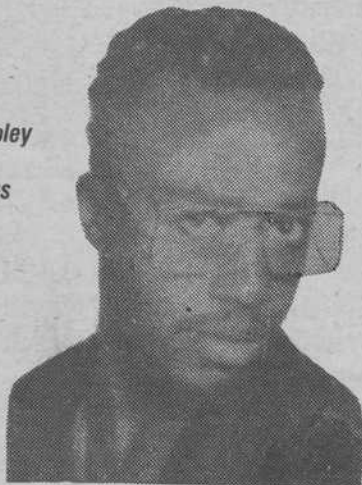
