1746 - Toussaint L'Overture, revolutionary leader of Haiti, was born on May 20.

1747 - Absalom Jones, the first Black minister ordained in America, was born a slave in Sussex, Delaware,

Prince Hall, successful businessman and founder of the Negro Free Masonry, was born.

1750 - Crispus Attucks, the first martyr of the American Revolution, escaped from his master in Framingham, Massachusetts, on Sept. 30. 1753 - Scipio Moorhead, earliest known Black artist, was born.

Lemuel Haynes, the first Negro to serve as pastor in a white congregation in the United States, was born on July 18.

1756 - John Woolman began his campaign against slavery on May 12.

1758 - Frances Williams, first Black college graduate in the Western Hemisphere, published Latin poems on April 17.

1759 - Paul Cuffee, business leader and philanthropist, was born on Jan. 17.
