Legendary Blues Great James Cotton at Sunset Park May 18

Legendary blues great James Cotton and his band will kick off the sixth annual Clark County Craft Fair and Rib Burn-Off with a concert beginning at 7:30 pm, May 18 at Sunset Park. The event is co-sponsored by the Las Vegas Blues Society. Admission is \$8: Blues Society members with current card get a one dollar discount. Advance tickets are available at Winchester Center, 3130 S. McLeod, until noon the day of the event.

The concert opens with Las Vegas' own Boogieman Band before James Cotton comes on at 8:30. Award-winning ribs, prepared by two of the winners of last year's Rib Burn-Off, will be available for purchase, as well as beer and soft drinks. Gates open at 6:00 p.m. for the picnic-style event.

James Cotton is one of the great proponents of the

Chicago style version of the Mississippi Delta Blues. His singing and harmonica playing have the earthy quality of his early mentors, Sonny Boy Williamson and Muddy Waters. Grafted onto that is the rhythm and blues sound that marked his departure from the shadow of Muddy Waters.

Cotton was steeped in the blues from an early age. His mother showed him how to play the harmonica when he was little more than a toddler in Tunica, Mississippi. As a lad, he lived with Sonny Boy Williamson for six years as a sort of musical apprentice. He struck out on his own at fifteen with his own band, recording for Sun records. He also played as a sideman for 'HOWLIN' Wolf.

Discovered by Muddy Waters, Cotton travelled with him to Chicago where he played in Water's band for twelve years. He finally left to form his own, more rockoriented group. Recently, Cotton's work has showed a return to the more basic blues style in two Grammynominated albums, "Live at Antone's" and "Take Me Back,"

Friday night's blues concert marks the opening of the Clark County Craft Fair and Rib Burn-Off, a family event featuring fine crafts for sale, a rib competition, children's activities and continuous music by the Press, Stetzen and the Boogleman Band. The Craft Fair is open 11:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. Saturday and Sunday at Sunset Park. Admission is \$2 for adults, \$1 for children twelve and under. Children under three are admitted free.
