Scholarship Value

The scholarship provides \$2,000 per school year. Funds are paid through your school's Office of Financial Aid; \$1,000 at the beginning of each semester to each accepted applicant.

How To Apply

Submit applications to the Chairman, Scholarship Committee, National Newspaper Publishers Association, Room 948, National Press Building, Washington, D.C. 20045

What To Submit

Applicants must submit:

- A transcript indicating: (a) a cummulative scholastic average of at least 2.5 and (b) full-time enrollment in junior- or senior-level classes.
- A letter or recommendation from the chairman of the journalism department or a professor.
- A personal statement of willingness to consider employment with a Black-owned newspaper upon graduation.


When To Apply

At least three months before the start of the school term.

About Internship

A summer Internship is offered between the junior and senior years with a National Newspaper Publishers Association member newspaper. Students earn \$1,000 for eight weeks plus \$500 for living expenses. An additional \$500 may be provided for four extra weeks of intern work if desired and funded by the publisher





The Program

This program assists African American college students in their junior or senior years. You must have the aptitude, interest and scholastic standing which indicate the potential for a successful journalistic career. Students in their first or second years and graduate students are also eligible.

Eligibility Requirements

- 1. A verified 2.5 cumulative average.
- Enrollment as a full-time junior or senior in a recognized school offering courses in journalism.
- Recommendation by the chairman of the journalism department or a professor.
- Expression of a willingness to consider employment with a Black-owned newspaper upon graduation.



Intern Application

Apply no later than April 30 and include:

- A recommendation from the chairman of the journalism department or a professor.
- Indication of preference of newspaper or geographical area of a desired assignment.
- A resume of acedemic and newspaper work experience.

Send application to the Executive Director, National Newspaper Publishers Association, 948 National Press Building, Washington, D.C. 20045.

This program is not limited to students in the editorial writing sequence. Students studying advertising, marketing and management are also encouraged to apply.

Public Relations

You must provide a photograph of yourself and periodic letters indicating your academic activities as the basis for "hometown" news stories in our member newspapers.

health care. More specifically, services are designed to:

- 1. reduce infant mortality and the incidence of preventable diseases and disabilities among children, reduce the need for impatient and long-term care services, and increase the number of children immunized against disease; and.
- 2. provide rehabilitation services for blind and disabled persons under the age of 16 receiving benefits under the Supplemental Security Income (SSI) program for disabled children; and,
- 3. provide services in locating medical care for children who are disabled or who are suffering from conditions leading to a disability; and,
- 4. enable the Secretary of Health and Human Services to provide grants for special projects to promote child and maternal health.

Every child has the right to a healthy body. By supporting and expanding quality programs like the MCH block grant and other services the federal government can work more ambitiously toward ensuring this right.

of affirmative action by the Supreme Court, which handed down the decisions upsetting local set-aside programs.

Still to come is another test of affirmative action -- the Court will soon rule on the Federal Communications Commission's policy of giving minority applicants for braodcasting licenses special consideration, based on the nation's interest in diverse ownership of the nation's airwaves and on correcting past discrimination that kept blacks out of the broadcasting business.

Despite this, the Justice Department is actually urging the court of overrule the agency's program -- a baseless move that can only damage the Administration's standing among African Americans.

Sound national policies and wiser use of the vast buying power represented by African Americans could help black business grow and narrow the racial gap in business and in income.
