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From the Desk of the KCEP Community Affairs Director...

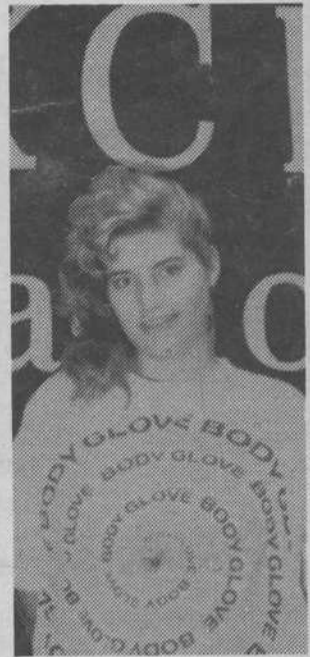

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ting the official policy of the NAACP. Benjamin Hooks, the national president, has always been very supportive of black colleges and knows well that if there are no black colleges, there will be no future leaders for the NAACP or the black community - like Heidi Lovett.

However, the U.S. News article is just as biased as are Richardson's reported remarks, and just as uninformed. The story used a chart to show how few whites go to black schools, but no chart to show how few blacks are in white schools and how few ever graduate.

Neither U.S. News nor the Louisiana NAACP leader seem to understand that black colleges are experiencing an enrollment explosion because the consumers (young black people) prefer them. And that after almost 50 years, all intelligent people understand there is little practical advantage in going to white schools.

All intelligent people, other

than those who would rather sit beside a white person than get an education, know that. And blacks like the woman in Kansas, have been psychologically conditioned against themselves that they have become the victims of both racism and self-hatred.

That's why young blacks like Heidi Lovett represents our future as a people. Instead of cooperating with the Louisiana officials and white magazines to make their case against black colleges, she has decided to lead the fight to save them.

"I would definitely like the students of Xavier University to participate in Black College Day this Sept. 24. I would be more than happy to organize a New Orleans campaign to transport students from Baton Rouge. This could be done very easily through a joint effort of the Greeks. Add the SGA of Xavier, Dillard and SUNO - along with the African College of Tulane (ACT), the African-American Student Union at the University of New Orleans (UNO), the Office of Minority Affairs at Loyola and the SGA of

Delgado Community College," Lovett writes.

The Louisiana so-called desegregation ruling, the latest in the Adams litigation of 1974, according to U.S. News, "...has raised important legal issues that may ultimately be decided by the Supreme Court" and "could affect desegregation plans under way throughout the South and in border states." So there is still time to stop the enemy.

That's why it's important that Ricky Bell (Tampa); Brian Edmunds (Philadelphia); Ruth Woods (Indianapolis); Jennifer Kirby (Springfield, MA); Eugene James, Joseph Jenkins, Leslie Wyche (New York); among others, have offered to help preserve the black colleges in North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, Georgia, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Maryland, Texas, Mississippi, Alabama, Florida, Missouri, Arkansas, Kentucky, and Virginia.

West Virginia has already destroyed its historic black colleges with these racist "desegregation" maneuvers
