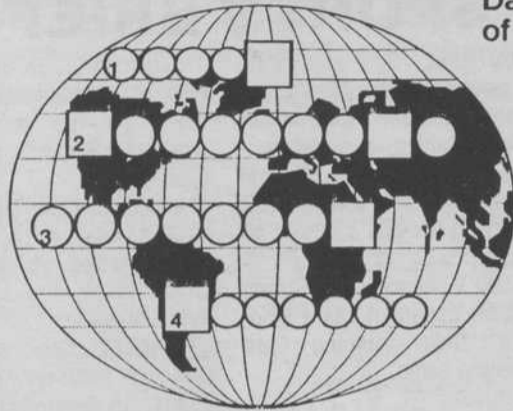


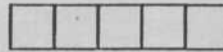
UNITED STATES PEACE CORPS WORLD WISE PUZZLE

Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity, Inc. Supports New Orientation Program

Fraternities and sororities have always played a major role in producing some of our greatest national and world leaders, since their existence. Many of these organizations pride themselves on leadership, scholarship, brotherhood, and community service activities. However, some Greek organizations have been negatively labeled as "party-hazing animals" who disrupt the college environment. This can be attributed to a few poorly oriented members. As a means to deter these types of practices, Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity, Incorporated has, in conjunction with the other membership organizations of the National Pan Hellenic Council, adopted a new pledge-free orientation program for new members.

Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity's Western Regional Director, Darnell Cooley, is in full support of the new orientation program and states, "As Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity enters into the '90s, the old practice of hazing as a form of initiation must give way to a new consciousness of social responsibility. Therefore it is incumbent upon us, as leaders, to implement innovative orientation procedures which accentuate community service and scholastic excellence."

All smokers and induction of new members into the fraternity have been put on hold until October 1, 1990, because Cooley has designated September as the month for training the mem-

bership on the new policies and procedures of orientating new members into the fraternity.

Cooley "hopes that this move on the part of Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity will create a stronger bond between parents, communities and university campuses, and that this will encourage prospective members who otherwise wouldn't consider joining a fraternity to take a closer look at the positive things our organization does."

Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity, Incorporated, an international organization known for its community service programs, was founded at Howard University in Washington, D.C. on January 9, 1914. The three founders, A. Langston Taylor, Leonard F. Morse, and Charles I. Brown organized a Greek letter fraternity that truly exemplified the ideals of Brotherhood, Scholarship and Service.

Today, seventy-six years later, Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity strives to become the leading proactive community service organization by focusing on issues that impact the African-American male to strengthen America's communities.

The founders' deep conviction is preserved through the fraternity's motto of "Culture for Service and Service for Humanity," and through the dedication and beliefs of a membership of 90,000 collegiate, business and professional men.
