At the end of the year for the last three years, we have selected three newspapers annually as our flagship newspapers. Each year it has gotten tougher because the pool of newspapers continues to get stronger. But this as you can imagine a pleasant situation that will continue to get even tougher.

One stipulation is that no newspaper is eligible to be a flagship newspaper two years consecutively. A second stipulation is that the column run in the newspaper for at least a year. The only exception of course was our first year, 1988. The following are our first three years' flagship newspapers:

• 1988: The Long Beach (CA) Times, The Roanoke (VA) Tribune and the San Bernadino (CA) Precinct-Reporter.

• 1989: The Florida Sentinel-Bulletin (Tampa), New York, Big Red News and the San Diego Voice & Viewpoint.

• 1990: The Buffalo (NY) Criterion, the Richmond (VA) Voice and the San Bernadino (CA) Precinct-Reporter.

## KING'S PEACE QUILT

Apartheid is defined as an official policy of racial segregation promulgated in the Republic of South Africa.

A peace quilt is a symbol of concern to the equality of coexistence for all.

The 696 students of Harriet Treem Elementary School completed a project to express their feelings and understanding of the struggle of African National Congress leader, Nelson Mandela, with a peace quilt.

With the created assorted patches designed by students, teachers and staff, exemplified the views and feelings of how Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. fought against discrimination.

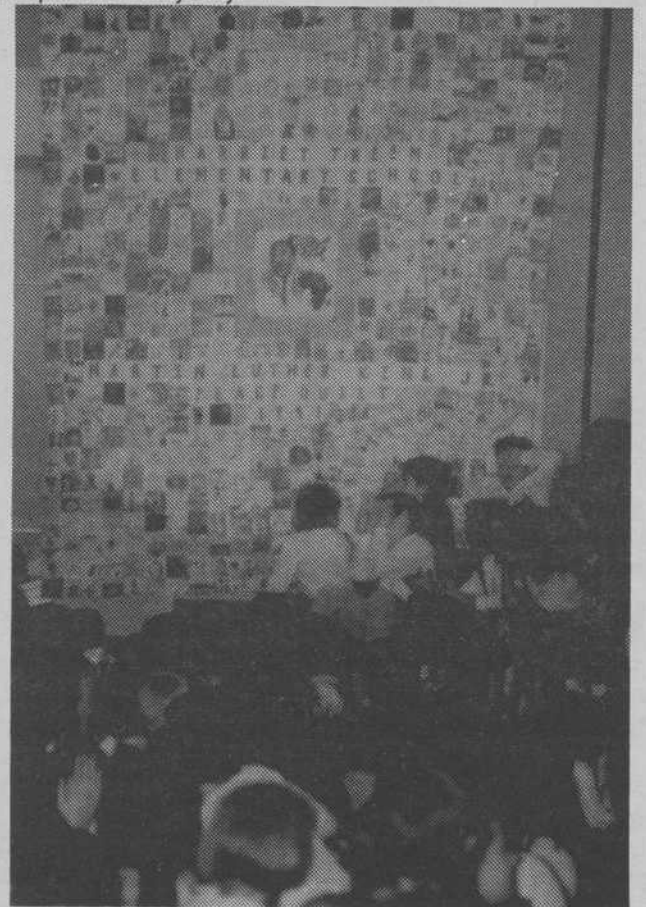
