The fact that Columbus didn't discover America was a prevalent subject at the Northern Nevada Black Cultural Awareness Society's Martin Luther King Banquet. The banquet, held Jan. 21, featured speaker Jawanza Kunjufu.

Dr. Kunjufu is a Chicago-based educational consultant. Kunjufu is author of several publications on black children, which include "Countering the Conspiracy to Destroy Black Boys Volume I, II and III", "Developing Positive Self Images and Discipline for Black Children", and "To Be Popular or Smart: The Black Peer Group." He also conducts workshops across the country on how to improve black students' academic achievement.

Kunjufu spoke to nearly 700 people at the black tie event on multi-cultural education you must look at events in history from all perspectives. For example Europeans will tell you that Columbus discovered America, Native Americans will tell you that he was lost and that they discovered him. If you look at slavery, Europeans will tell you how it benefitted America's economy, African-Americans will tell you how it nearly devastated the black family. He also stressed that black history shouldn't only be taught during February. "How

The fact that Columbus didn't can you teach four million years cover America was a preva-in one month?" Kunjufu asked.

"Douglas should be taught when you teach about Lincoln, they lived at the same time. King should be taught when you teach Kennedy, they lived at the same time."

Kunjufu elucidated about the negative messages we send our children. He said that when children are young, everyone is beautiful. As they grow up they develop ideas about what is attractive, based on what they have been taught. If blonde hair and blue eyes are pretty or you talk about pretty eyes and pretty hair

then children automatically figure out what is ugly. If the opposite of "pretty" is a mirror image of themselves, this will have a negative impact on their self image.

Assemblyman Wendell P. Williams (Dist. 6, Las Vegas) was present to read a resolution from the State Assembly in observance of the Martin Luther King, Jr. Holiday. A Community Service Award was given to First Interstate Bank as the organization that has demonstrated outstanding service to further cultural awareness in the Truckee Meadows.
