**Houston Bound** with the NAACP's **ACT-SO Program**

Recently I had the pleasure of being the guest speaker for the Pomona (CA) Valley NAACP's ACTO-SO Awards Competition Program and shared some thoughts on "Afro-Academics." I believe that Dr. Benjamin Hooks would be pleased with my comments.

ACT-SO is an acronym for Afro-Academic, Cultural, Technological and Scientific Olympics. It is a major project of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People(NAACP.)

According to the NAACP, ACT-SO is rooted in the firm conviction that African Americans can succeed in the classroom at the superior levels of achievement constantly displayed by African Americans in the athletic arenas of the nation.

The NAACP continues that "It is the goal of ACT-SO to afford the same respect for black

scholastic and cultural achievementthatis awarded heroes (and heroines) in the world of sports."

I referred to the students and parents in the audience as geneses, not in the abstract sense of the word that it is often mentioned - someone who has more intelligence than someone else.

The students and parents that evening were geneses in the truest and broadest sense of the word, that is, they all had interests, skills and abilities.

The key was to now define and then refine those interests. skills and abilities. Once these things are done, they (especially the students) should use those interests and skills to benefit humanity.

On that evening, I told them that motivation comes from within. At this point in their lives, I could not motivate them. KRS-One could not, X-Clan could not, nor could even Harvard or

However, we should step forward and become reinforcers of that motivation that was nurtured by their parents, families and other significant others while they were much younger.

The Humanities, Performing Arts, Sciences and Visual Arts are the categories that the students compete in this annual program. Some examples of humanities would be; poetry, playwriting, essays and music composition.

Performing Arts include dance, dramatics, music instrumentals and music vocals. Sciences would include Biology, Chemistry, Computer Science and Mathematics. Visual Arts include drawing, painting, photography and sculpture. These are not complete lists for any category, but represents examples of

I told the Pomona Valley students that I and many others were proud of their accomplishments to date. We were equally proud of all of the young people from across the nation who will be their competitors in Houston.

Among my challenges to them were 1) always have fun. 2) to always remember that motivation comes from within, 3) strive to be a leader instead of just a prominent personality in their respective fields of interest and 4) continue to support and challenge our African institutions such as the Church, colleges, newspapers and civic organiza-

Her free seminar is directed towards helping displaced homemakers, such as widows, single parents or divorcees become more self confident and more self sufficient.

"I direct my remarks for these women, but the class would be beneficial for anyone who is seeking to add more direction to life and wants to better manage her activities," Duncan-Daniel
