

This sound has a name, the name of a man...Martin Luther King, Jr., whose birthday is celebrated as a national holiday annually. It was in this world that Martin Luther King, Jr., began to make himself hear. We do not have to repeat here the many degrading terms which embraced his ears. We remember them too well from our youth. But that sound is dying today, and the world has come to recognize Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., his just struggle and, through it, the just desires of his people. The world recognized Dr. King with its highest honor, the Nobel Peace Prize. In accepting the honor, Dr. King realized that it was not exclusively the property of one man. The Peace Prize belongs not exclusively to one people, nor to one race. Such an honor was bestowed upon him as representative of a way of life, a way of life that stands up for Humankind, and which counts Humankind one by one. It is not a difficult nor complex way of living. It is the right way!

Martin Luther King, Jr., was a simple man. He never thought of himself as a warrior, as a knight in shining armor. He just fell in love with humanity and had a dream of a better world of a denied people and went afar to forge that dream into a reality to bring into focus and in reach of his people the promise of freedom. Inside that dark world in which prejudice, discrimination and bias had locked his people his spirit shone bright, and was undimmed for even in darkness he could see many wonders...It is these wonders that make his legacy to the
