If you have a strong black vote and if you have strong political leadership in a state, it will be very difficult for the state to eliminate or merge the black public college." "Only the strongest — from the point of view of endowment, faculty and interest of students in their institutions — will survive." President Emeritus Albert Manley of Spelman College (Ga.)

"Black colleges could be major resources for this nation in contracts with Third World, the African...and Caribbean world." Andrew Billingsly, Morgan State University (Md.).

"I don't believe that our future as black institutions is based on our educating a student that nobody else wants." James Lyons, president of Bowie State University (Md.).

Whiting concludes that the future of historically black colleges rests on "improved management and financing, an increased competitive spirit, innovative programming addressed to the larger community, market place considerations, demographics, increasing diversity in the country, (possibly) reconfiguration, and establishment and maintenance of perceived quality."
