SAN MARCOS - "Competition is tough and students are facing the tightest job market I've seen in my 19 years in the college placement business," reported Bob Jenkins, director of the Southwest Texas State University Career Planning and Placement Center.

That only increases the important opportunities offered to college students and recent graduates at the third annual National Minority Expo for Career Job Opportunities (Job Expo 3) April 9 and 10 in Strahan Coliseum on the SWT campus. The first day will feature business and industry employers while the second hosts education and governmental agencies.

Jenkins said employers are telling him the expo is the most cost effective way they have of recruiting. As a result, Jenkins has only a limited number of booths available for the opening day and has posted a "no vacancy" sign for the second day of the event.
