Johannesburg, South Africa Despite White South Africa voters' stunning vote on Wednesday to plan to share power with the Black majority of the country, African National Congress (ANC) leader Nelson Mandela expressed that apartheid was still "very much alive," in South Africa.

Overwhelmingly, Whites voted 69 percent to 31 percent to forge ahead with talks that

would end white rule and give Blacks voting rights for the first time in South Africa's history.

The margin of support for President F.W. de Klerk's reforms, which was much higher than expected, gave him the decisive mandate he needed to continue negotiation's with Mandela's ANC and other Black

groups. President de Klerk and his National Party predicted victory.

tive Party. The referendum called for the country's 3.3 million white voters to decide whether they want to continue negotiating with the Black majority to forge a new non-racial constitution. There are over 30

million Blacks in south Africa. Andries Treurnicht, leader of the pro-apartheid Conservative Party, conceded defeat, butrightwing groups threatened that they

would fight rather than except a Black government.

However, the government said the only way to bring peace and foreign investment was to negotiate a new deal with Blacks, which would end white domination.

Heavy early voting - during which many polling stations in all four of the county's provinces ran out of paper ballots - was seen by most as good news for the "YES" campaign.

But, despite the good news, Mandela still expressed to reporters, "Apartheid is still very much alive. I still cannot vote in
