She said that because she had a background of working with people of all persuasions, she would be an asset to the board and would be willing to do her homework to institute programs to help gang members and at risk groups and other minorities to graduates and excel. In the final analysis all of the candidates appeared credible and capable. Lois Tarkanian, board President said it would be a difficult decision.

Upon deliberation and resumption of the meeting the nominees were two, first Dr. McMillan who received two votes from members Judy Witt and

Lois Tarkanian with one abstention, from Howard Hollingsworth.

Next was Rhodes, who received five year five yes votes and, one abstention from Witt. Witt later changed her abstention to a yes vote in the second round which gave Rhodes a unanimous appointment.

Dr. Dan Newburn said that he had received numerous letter and calls from reputable community leaders voicing their support for Rhodes which helped the board in their decision.

Among these who supported Rhodes were Assemblyman Wendell P. Williams, and Morse Arberry, Yvonne Atkinson-Gates and a host of others.

Rhodes said that he will be hosting a series of "Town Hall Meetings" with his constituents to get their input.

the different sayings kids use to combat the urge of trying drugs. Shirley Barber, principal of Mable Hoggard, said "that the posters gives student the opportunity to become aware of what's going on around them". "The importance of this yearly program helps to expose the kindergartners of the school to the dangers of drug use of themselves and to their family", she added. You can never start early enough for effective measures, she pointed out.

Planning officer for the Economic Opportunity Board (EOB), Alex Mendez, who helped coordinate the fair, summed it up best, "statistics say this is a crucial time for these youngsters, and prohibition doesn't work. Only by education through these kinds of programs can we reach them".

Alex also acknowledged that EOB's concern in the drug fair was a positive move to become involved within the community's schools and residents. Through efforts of the co-sponsor EOB, which supervises a treatment center for adult chemical dependency, help was solicited from different groups and organizations to take part in the annual event.

Mable Hoggard honor student Marcello Sawyer, who did not go to an elementary school that had a drug abuse program in it, felt that the combination of the display booths and professionals, as well as the assembly program expanded his outlook of what harm and destruction drugs can do.

The school's drug fair succeeded in reaching out and touching the future leaders of tomorrow, with a strong message today.






