Rancho Drive, Carey Avenue, and Main Street, so residents could neither enter nor leave the area.

State Assemblyman Wendell P. Williams stated Wednesday that had Metro shown as much concern for the Nucleus Plaza and other West Las Vegas businesses as they did for the downtown hotels and casinos, perhaps some of the damage may have been prevented.

Leaders were also upset by the fact that police felt they were justified in turning back almost 200 protesters who were marching toward the downtown area.

"We felt that if that group had reached downtown, they may have set fire to the hotels," Lt. Franks said, adding, "had it not been for the officers, this town could have gone up in flames."

Community leaders, still felt that if the protesters were allowed to peacefully march, as they were Saturday, alot of the violence could have been prevented.

Many key political figures, including Governor Bob Miller and Mayor Jan Jones, expressed disagreement with the King verdicts that initiated the violence in Los Angeles and Las Vegas.

Rev. Scott went a step further by saying he believed that the events should be investigated by a grand jury to determine who was responsible for the violence and whether law enforcement officials acted improperly.

A community clean-up is scheduled for this Saturday.
