
NATIONAL ALLIANCE AGAINST RACIST & POLITICAL REPRESSION

WEAPONS ASIDE

Did you know that there are more than 200 million guns in America and that the vast majority of those are made and owned by Whites? That one fact alone should be enough to put to rest rumors that militant Blacks with contraband arms pose a serious threat to this country. In reality, nothing could be farther from the truth. Blacks alone simply don't have the firepower capability to take over America.

The facts didn't seem to matter to many local Whites who made a run on survival and gun stores. They bought every weapon they could find to protect themselves and their families just in case the riots has spread.

In the recent local riots, police reported sporadic gunfire in the West Las Vegas vicinity, mainly from semiautomatic handguns. Despite their initial slow reaction, do you think for one minute the police, of the military, could actually be held at bay for an extended length of time by a few individuals brandishing low-level semi-automatic, or automatic weapons?

Why do I raise this issue? In light of the Los Angeles riots and racial upheavals in other locales, including Las Vegas, many people are speculating about the potential for open revolt sometime in the near future.

But let's not kid ourselves, the reason this topic is on the front burner is because some people mistakenly believe Blacks to be an inherently violent people. I'm here to tell you, that's simply not true.

If that were so, we would have revolted a long time ago during slavery when the odds were in our favor — one plantation owner and a few overseers versus hundreds of slaves. In reality, I don't know that it is fair to say that any race is "naturally" war-like. But, for the sake of argument, let's look further.

In terms of this nation;s history, who enslaved Blacks and transported them from Africa to this continent to work as slaves? Who ousted the Indians and claimed their land? In recent months, who initiated the war against Iraq?

Obviously, these acts were not perpetrated directly by Blacks, because we don't have the power to impose wholesale aggression on other large groups.

Another factor to consider are killings at the hands of police. Have you ever heard of a Black policeman anywhere in America shooting to kill a fleeing suspect? Can you say the same for White police officers?

When we look closely at ourselves, we don't see much that's positive. Unfortunately, crime among Blacks is usually Black-on-Black. Very few homicides by comparison involve a Black who kills a White person.

The research strongly suggest that the reason Blacks kill black is because of pent-up frustrations derived from living Black in a predominantly White oriented society.

In light of the these statistics, why are Whites so fearful of Blacks? Why, when a Black male is walking down the sidewalk in the direction of a oncoming group of Whites, are the Whites prone to cross over to the other side—despite the fact that the Blacks make is well-dressed and not exhibiting hostile behavior? A straightforward explanation might be, "I feel guilty that me and my people have consistently wronged you for the last four hundred years so I've got to keep my guard up for fear of retaliation? FEAR.

Until we can get rid of fear, some false, some real, we'll never be able to bridge the racial gap.

five negroes. I will not justify nor elevate that debate to a level of seriousness by commenting on the issue itself. What I will point out is the following: As African Americans we have a myriad of issues that are used to divide us. Whether we have straight hair, kinky hair, big noses, small noses, thin lips, thick lips; whether we belong to the Crips or the Bloods, the Egyptian cobras or the Axstone rangers, and I know I am dating myself, all these things are used to keep us fighting and killing each other as opposed to turning our anger and our wrath on our enemy. Clearly, we don't catch hell because we have thick lips, we don't catch hell because we don't live on the Westside, we don't catch hell because we belong to the Bloods, we don't catch hell because we belong to the Crips, we don't catch hell because we have kinky hair, because we have slick hair. We catch hell because, from the collective perspective, the Beast, we are all black and we're all targets.

It is time to put aside petty differences and understand why we are in the situation we're in. It's not because we weren't light enough, it's not because we weren't dark enough. It's because we weren't wise enough to so organize ourselves, so arm ourselves, so ready ourselves for struggle, that clearly when our adversary chose to attack us they would be risking their very lives and their very being. Only when that situation occurs, where it is clear that the expense of the attack on any of our people would be so devastating as to be suicidal, will our people begin to advance.

While I personally do not necessarily advocate a violent posture, we must be realistic, violence is as much a part of this

country as "motherhood and apple pie," to borrow a few words. This doesn't mean that I advocate violence, but at the same time I'm not against violence in self defense. I don't even call it violence when it's self defense, I call it "INTELLIGENCE."

If we are going to categorize ourselves, let's be more realistic about doing it, let's categorize ourselves as those who are willing to fight and those who are not m and forget the other divisions, those are not important, the last one is.

What we find however, is that these merchants put their businesses in the hearts of minority communities, making large amounts of money from these communities; and at the same time not having a drop of respect for the people who keep them in

business. They don't even respect the basic human or economic value of these consum-

By listening to racist propaganda from conservatives and believing in the Japanese government's assessment that minority communities in America are inferior; they have been brainwashed into believing minority communities don't deserve respect

This delusion of reality will never be accepted. It is O.K. to believe in racist principles, if your private service is located outside the minority communities. (Country Clubs).
