Over 300 members of the community, including city, county and state officials, were on hand Monday, May 18, to show their support for the Las Vegas chapter of the NAACP in their effort to raise monies to rebuild their headquarters, which was burned during the unrest in West Las Vegas three week ado

For close to 20 years the NAACP offices have been located at the Nucleus Plaza, 940 W. Owens Ave., and it has been reported that unless land was donated elsewhere, the new offices would more-than-likely remain in the area.

National Executive Director of the NAACP, Dr.

Benjamin L. Hooks was also on hand, along with Governor Bob Miller, at the Moulin Rouge for the rally which raised over \$14,000 for the local chap-

Local NAACP President, Rev. Jesse D. Scott, expressed to all in attendance that he wanted people of all races to come together to help rebuild the NAACP offices because the organization is not just for Blacks

"If it were not for the NAACP, we may very easily be involved in a civil war," Scott stated.


After being introduced, Dr. Hooks enlivened the captive audience with chants of." What Do We Want? JUSTICE! When Do We Want It? NOW!

sippi. Hooks also eloquently expressed how violence didn't break out in March of 1991 after the four L.A. police officers were caught on videotape beating Rodney King.

"Blacks didn't burn cities, riot or loot. We thought, 'finally, they went too far.'" We waited for over a year for the American justice system to work for us."

Though he said he opposed the violence that followed the verdicts, Hooks also added that he is opposed to the violence that is imposed on African-Americans everyday.

The third annual African-American Summit Conference activities will commence on Friday, May 22, 1992 on the campus of the University of Nevada, Las Vegas. This year's conference theme, "AFROCENTRICITY - THE WAY FOR AFRICAN-AMERICANS" has pulled

together an African-American rainbow of speakers, workshops, and meetings that will have a definite effect on Nevada's future.

Due to the tremendous response and it's community impact in the past, this year's conference had to be moved to UNLV to accommodate the anticipated public participation. More than 700 people are expected to attend the free activities that will take place for three days amid an array of community, political and professional networking.

This year's quest speaker for the Malcolm X Celebration during the conference is Neely Fuller, Jr., author of the acclaimed book, "The United Independent Code/ System/Concept -A Text book For Thought. Speech and/or Action For Victims of Racism (White Supremacy)" Mr. Fuller, who's home base is now Washington, D.C. is well known for his community activism and influence in civil rights in the United States. Quoting Mr. Fuller, "Racism has done more to promote non-justice than any other socio-material system known to have been produced, or supported by the people of the known universe. No major problem in existence between people of the known universe can be eliminated until racism is elimi-
