weeks with a herniated disc in his lower back. Tony Gwynn, the San Diego Padres' four-time NL batting champion, fractured the tip of his right middle finger when he closed a car door on it. Gwynn's status is listed as day-to-day.

NFL NOTES: Two California cities-Sacramento and Oakland-were eliminated from a list of cities in the running for NFL expansion teams at a meeting of league owners this past Tuesday. Two of the five cities that are left in the running will be chosen in time for the 1994 season. Baltimore, Memphis, St.Louis, Charlotte and Jacksonville are the cities still being considered. **NBA NOTES:** 

Michael Jordan became the seventh player in NBA history to win the NBA's Most Valuable Player award at least three times. Jordan, who led Chicago to a NBA-best67-15 record, received 80 of 96 first-place votes from a nationwide panel of sports writers and broadcasters for a total of 900 points. Portland's Clyde Drexler finished second with 12 first-place votes and 561 points,

and San Antonio's David Robinson was third with two firsts and 337 points. Drexler and Jordan could possibly face each other in the NBA finals if both Portland and Chicago advance past Utah and Cleveland, respectively.

The Los Angeles Lakers introduced Randy Pfund as their new head coach, replacing Mike Dunleavy, who left L.A. to coach the Milwaukeee Bucks. Pfund, 40, was an assistant for the Lakers for seven years, working under New York Knicks Coach Pat Riley for five years and Dunleavy for two.
