NATIVE SON...MORE THAN A BOOKSTORE

"...Americans as a group are alliterate, that means we can read...but don't"

I've been in Native Son bookstore a few times since its opening, but never long enough to really observe my surroundings or take time to indulge in the extensive book collection. (Native Son is an Afrocentric bookstore, located at 1301 D Street).

On this particular Sunday, not only did I have a chance to look at some hot new titles but I had a chance to minole with some wonderful individuals. The clientele alone is quite impressive. Everyone from a fireman to an entrepreneur that owned a elevator company passed through this store. In one corner there was a conversation on education, the other talked of Malcolm X, and in the back of the room an intense game of chess was being played. The male bonding that was taking place in this room was absolutely wonderful-considering the negative image media paints African men to be-the scene that

I witnessed didn't include any loud, ignorant, hopeless lazy men. No, in this room I saw strong African men. I heard laughter and thought provoking conversations...but most of all brotherly love. The owner, Sam Smith, was floating around the room playing devils advocate in every conversation. Between answering a question here and asking one there-he took a few minutes and talked to us about his store and some very important issues.

LINDA: Sam, your store looks like its generating a lot of business...is there always this much traffic coming through your business?

SAM: Yes, I'm sure you've noticed the number of people that have come through just in the few minutes you've been here. Africans from every background and every phase of life come to my store. And as you can see-there's no fussing or cussing...just people having a good time.

LINDA: So, is it a place for social gathering?

SAM: People to come and

socialize, but mostly for information, to get tutoring or to take part in deep discussions on world issues.

LINDA: Speaking of deep discussions-I am told that on Sundays you hold rap sessions at your bookstore... Is this true? If so, what topics are discussed?

SAM: Yes, we do have rap sessions on Sundays from 4-5p.m. We discuss the issues that are affecting us on a local as well as a national level. Recently, our topic was the verdict of the Rodney King trial. Now we're trying to predict the future of the four Black males accused of beating the white motorist. Also, what are we going to do now that the gangs have developed a sense of consciousness? So, if you have an argument or a view that you would like to express or have dissected...come

LINDA: I can't help but notice the number of men in your storeare men your biggest clientele?

SAM: Actually women and students are my biggest clients or people like yourself who have a full agenda.

LINDA: I had a chance to look at some of your titles here-you have books that I thought were out of print.

SAM: I have the most extensive collection of African-American literature in the city. I also carry non-traditional titles. I subscribe to nine magazines, the Los Angeles Sentinel, The Final Call, and have been saving the Sentinel Voice for over 10 years. I also have used books.

LINDA: I see you have my favorite author Terry McMillian. What are some of your best sellers.

SAM: Malcolm X-I have eve-

rything on Malcolm X and if its not in at the time someone asks for it, I can get it. Others include Superman to Man, Miseducation of the Negro and Isis Papers. For those who are interested in non-traditional religious titles, I have the Niggers Bible, The Blackman's Bible and Troubling Biblical Waters. That's not to take away business from those brothers and sisters that are in the religious realm of the business.

LINDA: Do you carry nonblack literature?

SAM: Although the majority of my books are of the Afrocentric nature-I will purchase and sell non-black titles.

LINDA: Sam, lets talk about the high illiteracy rate that is sweeping this country; primarily concerning our African-American men.

SAM: The biggest sin is knowing how to read and not reading. We like to see and hear. Reading is a passive type process and we don't do it enough...especially our Black men. During their creative years and hyperactive years they spend too much time in the streets instead of reading and
