(Continued from Page 16) obtaining knowledge. People hate it when I bring forth statistics, but 75% of blacks in college are female-you can't dispute the system. Of course we can examine why, but I'll leave that to the sociologists. I can only call it as I see it.

LINDA: Opening this bookstore was a start to the healing process. What else are you doing to get people to open up a book?

SAM: I am always encouraging sisters and brothers to read. pass out positive words of en-

couragement each day like the one on the wall, "If you always do what you've always done, you'll always get what you've always got." I give classes on the Fire Dept. exam and GED. I also tutor students in reading and math.

LINDA: Let's say you're a young African-American male/ female who's just getting started in black literature. What book would you recommend starting off with?

SAM: First, I'd have to consider my age and maturity level. LINDA: 20's and somewhat mature for their age.

SAM: I'd recommend Superman to Man. Here you have a brother that is a doctor who is having a conversation with a white senator.

The senator gives the brother all the arguments on why Black folks are inferior and the brother shoots down every argument with European sources. Great

LINDA: Besides running this bookstore, you're also the Deputy/Fire Marshal for the Clark County Fire Department. How do you do it all?

own daily experiences as a police officer. I have

seen how white police officer deal negatively with

blacks. I was unable to say anything because I was

a rookie. I know that black officers can better relate

to their own people from my own personal experi-

ence. It is extremely ironic that the black police

officer can deal with Whites just as well because in

this society, we have always had to deal with

whites properly. These are some of the reasons

why Metro is so resented in this community. The

only way that this relationship will ever get better

between Metro and the black community is for

Metro to treat blacks with dignity instead of like

"Gorillas in the Mist."

"Slow Incandescent Fire." Aftertheir marrige, De Lavallade and Holder pursued their careers together and seperately. Carmen suceeded her cousin Janet Collins as prima ballerina of the Metropolitian Opera where she remained for two years. She retired to have a son and Holder joined the opera. Both Carmen and Geoffrey danced in John Butler's Company. Holder later appeared in Hollywood Films and Carmen began dancing with Alvin Ailey's troupe. They both danced in many more revues with Holder, later becoming the "Uncola man In the 7-UP commercials. Holder also choreographed two all black Broadway musicals The Wiz in 1975 and Timbukty in 1978. In The Wiz he directed and designed the costumes and won Tony Awards in both categories.
