Shortly after the Civil War, when the United States recognized its splintered military to meet the demands of reconstruction and national expansion, there were not enough white soldiers to go around. So the Army created its first permanent all-black units, the 9th and 10th Calvalry regiments.

These new regiments were sent to the West, initially, where they developed into distinguished fighting forces. They helped to introduce the rule of law along the Mexican border, and to bring about the capitulation of the Indians on the frontier. The black troopers rode so long on the American Plains that they became known as the Buffalo

But they never got the lasting credit they deserved. The 9th and 10th Calvaries remained in exsistance until the 1950's: they battled everyone from Pancho Villa to Adolf Hitler. Yet for reasons of carelessness (and some say bigotry) they have been largely relegated to the barely remembered reaches of military

Recently however, the Buffalo Soldiers were remembered. as a memorial was erected at Fort Leavenworth in Kansas. The 10th Calvalry Regiment was organized at that 150-year-old Army post, and a statue of a black man on a horse will be dedicated this summer on the
