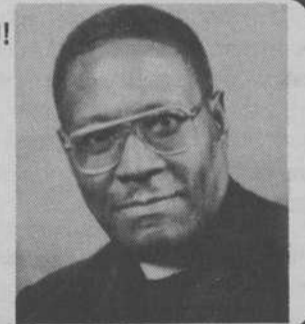

DR. GIBSON SPEAKS

The first full day of activities at the NAACP's 1992 Annual Convention at Nashville's Convention Center climaxes tonight. Monday July 13th, with a Public Mass Meeting at which Dr. William F. Gibson, Chairman, National NAACP Board of Directors, will deliver his convention speech. The time is 7 P.M. and the location is the Convention Center Exhibit Hall East.

Earlier in the day, the NAACP's Commerce and Industry Show will open doors from 10 A.M. to 6 P.M. in the Convention Center Exhibit Hall Center. Insides will be the booths of over 200 major corporations as well as government and non-profit agencies. Outside of the exhibit Hall, space has been provided for a number of minority vendors, many of whom are displaying hand crafted art and artifacts as well as other items.

Guest speaker for the morning plenary session at 10 A.M. will be Dr. William Gray, President, United Negro College Fund. There will also be the Presentation of the Chairman's Corporate Social Responsibility Award to Hugh McColl Jr., President/CEO Nationsbank.

A highlight of the afternoon will be the presentation of the ACT-SO awards. The formal name of the program is the Afro-Academic, Cultural, Technological and Scientific Olympics. It is a national program that encourages academic achievement. Over \$300,000 in scholarships and prizes will be awarded to the top three finalists in more than 24 categories.
