world's greatest female athlete by easily winning the gold medal in the heptathlon, the two-day, seven-event competition. She became the first woman to win two Olympic gold medals in multi-event competition.

"You're the greatest athlete ever," said 1976 decathlon champion Bruce Jenner, following Jackie Joyner-Kersee's gold medal victory in the heptathlon.

Joyner-Kersee, exhausted from the grueling 800-meter finale, circled the track draped in a large U.S. flag. She totaled 7,044 points-the first time she has cracked 7,000 since winning the gold in Seoul. Irina Belova of the Unified Team was second with 6,845.

Joyner-Kersee became the first woman to repeat as Olympic heptathlon champion.

"Because it was so historic, I really wanted to get the gold," said Joyner-Kersee.

Not only did she become the first double heptathlon winner, she also became the second American woman to win the same track title in consecutive Olympics. The other was Wyomia Tyus, who won the 100 meters in 1964 and 1968.

The heptathlon has been contested in the Olympics only since 1984. Before that, the woman's multi-event in track and field was called the pentathlon.

Joyner-Kersee, of Canoga Park, California, won the 100-meter hurdles, 200-meter dash and the long jump. The high-jump, shot-put, javelin and 800 meters make up the rest of the heptathlon.

## PROUD OLYMPIC MOMENTS FOR BLACK ATHLETES



Wilma Rudolph gained worldwide stardom during the Olympics in Rome when she became the first American woman to win three gold medals in track and field when she won the 100 and 200 meter dashes and helped win the 400-meter relay in 1960.
