A constitutional ban on deficits, for example, would effectively wipe out chances for a Marshall Plan for America that would invest in our human and physical resources to make us competitive again.

Other important initiative would be stymied because a constitutional mandate to balance the budget would lock the nation into a fiscal straitiacket.

A second reason is that the current federal budget is an accounting artifact. It makes no distinction between current operating expenses, such as Congressional salaries, and long-term capital expenses, such as building a new airport that will

last for a hundred years. The argument that if sense to freeze an out dated accounting practice states can balance their budgets the federal govemment can, falls apart on that point.

State and local budgets generally separate those two expense categories, financing current expenses through taxes and capital expenses through borrowing.

Businesses operate that way, too, with regular expenses coming out of earnings and construction of new factories financed by borrowing. Family budgets are the same - with cars and homes financed by borrowing.

So long as the federal government runs a unified budget that lumps all spending in one pot it is likely to run a deficit, and it doesn't make any

into the constitution.

A third reason why the constitutional amendment approach is wrong is that it is bad economics. Economists expect governments to run budget surpluses in good times, with deficits to help stimulate the economy in bad times. Forcing a budget balance in both good times and bad ones is to force the country into a fiscal straitjacket that could push it deep into a permanent Depression.

That's what we'd be in for too, if a constitutional amendment mandated an end to the deficit within a short time frame. One study estimated it would result in a big drop in economic output, 3.4 million fewer jobs, huge cuts in social security and huge

tax hikes.

Finally, a rigid process effectively prevents the government from responding to emergencies whether a foreign policy crisis such as the Persian Gulf War or a domestic crisis such as the Los Angeles riot that required emergency aid and new urban programs.

We're running big deficits because a decade ago we cut taxes for the affluent and escalated military spending.

The deficit can be controlled now by reversing the process - raising taxes for the affluent and cutting military and other non-essential spending, and we don't need a constitutional amendment to

Jemison, who is single, was selected by NASA in June 1987 from over 1,800 qualifying applicants. In talking about her role as a "scientist astronaut," Jemison says, "Our responsibilities are to be familiar with the shuttle and how it operates, to do the

experiments once you get into orbit, to help launch the payloads or satellites, and also do extra-vehicular activities, which are space walks."

Jemison is very vocal about the relationship of blacks to NASA and the space program.

She feels that America, and the blacks, have benefitted from the advances made by space research, such as medicine, weather and the environment. She says, "Some might say that the environment is not a black

But, I worked in Los Angeles and I saw more black and Hispanic children than necessary with uncontrolled asthma as a result of pollution. Just as many of us get sick from these types of things, and, in fact, we have more problems with them because many of us don't have the availability of health care. I want to do something to better that."

Jemison feels that the space program offers promising careers for Americans toward the future and urges blacks to pursue them

"This is one time we can get in on the ground floor," Jemison says. A total of 1,033 black engineers, scientists, doctors, technicians and administrators work for NASA. Dr. Joseph D. Atkinson, Jr., who has headed NASA's Equal Opportunity proorams Office, and was member of the astronaut board, has said set."

of Jemison, "I was impressed because she was a very stately, intelligent, sincere and stable young woman. She is also extremely sensitive to the social needs of the community. I would call Dr. Jemison a national as-
