The Biblical writings within the Book of Exodus have had a significant meaning to oppressed people throughout the history of modern man. Enclosed in Exodus is the story of the Hebrew people who were delivered from Egypt, delivered out of the hands of their oppressors, and liberated from a psychological warfare that made a mass of people think in negative terms. The significance of this deliverance from Egypt was not that it took place. The beauty is found in the fact their liberation came about not out of an independence from the oppressor, but out of a dependence on a God by a historic revelation that became the faith of the Hebrew people.

Now, in the scriptural text of Exodus 2:1-10, we became involved with the actions of a woman: a woman who became a mother. She had conceived and given birth to a son; and seeing what a fine son he was, she kept him hidden for three months. This may sound strange to us who are living in the 20th Century, and we may ask ourselves, 'Why did she lock this creation that was given to her by the Creator in some secret hideout?' For someone who doesn't know the whole story, they could envision that the child was unwanted... or maybe the child was born out of wedlock... or maybe the child's conception interfered with the woman's professional career.

Those who do know the whole story can understand that this woman, the mother of Moses, did what she had to do out of love, and out of concern for the continuation of life. As we enter a new school year, in the wake of a boycott of the school district, the plight of the Black male, the increase in violent crime, the declining economy, and the growing lack of concern of the aspirations and desires of the African American community, let us get our act together
