## JOINT GROUNDBR EAKING PLANNED FOR NEW SCHOOLS

A joint groundbreaking ceremony for 11 new schools opening over the next two years will be held Friday, October 2.

The ceremony will be held from 4 p.m. to 5:30 p.m. at Theron Swainston Middle School, 3500 Gilmore Avenue, North Las Vegas. The event is open to the public. Among those attending will be students, school district

officials, city and county officials, and representatives of architectural firms

Ceremonial groundbreaking will be held for H.P. Fitzgerald Elementary School, William R. Lummis Elementary School, Ulis Newton Elementary School, Clarence A. Piggot Elementary School, Louis Wiener, Jr., Elementary School, Ernest A.

Becker, Sr., Middle School, Grant Sawyer Middle School, Horizon East High School and Horizon West High School - all of which will open for the 1993-94 school year.

The groundbreaking also includes Silverado High School and the expansion of ATTC as a specialty school in business. finance and other computer applications. Those buildings will open in fall 1994.

Construction has already begun on the two middle schools. Construction bids for the five elementary schools are expected by this December. The remaining schools will go out to bid this winter and spring.

The new schools are being built with money from the \$600 million bond issue approved by voters in 1988. Forty-one schools have been built so far with bond money: 15 schools that opened in 1990, 18 that opened in August 1991 and eight that opened in August 1992.

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
