

Conference's Top Two Rushers Go Head-To-Head

The UNLV Rebels, (2-1), coming off their second-worst defeat in school history after being rocked 59-6 in Oregon last Saturday, will open conference play this Saturday, in Stockton, California, against one of the most dangerous offensive units in the nation.

Labeled as the "Air Tigers," Pacific, (1-3, 0-1 in the Big West), arguably has the best QB/WR combination in Troy Kopp and Aaron Turner. When this dynamic duo is not in effect. RB Ryan Benjamin is blasting through the line averaging 5.8 yds. per carry. The Tigers are currently averaging 419 yards pergame, 276.5 of them through the air. What will make this game so intriguing, is UNLV's passing defense is #1 in the conference allowing a mere 95.2 yds. per game. The Rebels also have intercepted their three opponents five times, returning three of them for touchdowns.

UNLV, which leads their series with the Tigers 7-4, may receive a handicap sooner then kickoff if Pacific's Kopp remains out of commission. Kopp sprained his right ankle in a nonfootball related accident last week, and missed the SW Mis-

souri game. He remains questionable for Saturday's contest.

Should Kopp miss Saturday's contest, the Rebs could be spared the misery Kopp served up last season. He neared an NCAA record for accuracy when he completed 25 of 30 passes against UNLV. He completed 83.3% of his attempts for 357 vards and six touchdowns en route to a 44-23 victory.

All-American candidate Turner entered the season owning a pair of NCAA records, broke another last Saturday, and has five more waiting in the balance. He caught 10 passes for 169 yards against SW Missouri St. to record his 19th 100-yard game snapping the old NCAA mark of 18 by Florida State's Ron Sellers (1966-'68).

Benjamin, who is a candidate for the coveted Doak Walker National Running Back Award, ranks first in the Big West and 13th in the nation with his 120.8 ypg. avg.

Pacific's high-powered runner will not be the only prominent running back featured in Saturday's game, as UNLV tailback Shannon McLean also is ranked among national leaders. McLean entered the Oregon game as the third-leading rusher

in the nation but the Duck defense held him to just 39 yards on 15 carries. In fact until Benjamin's 209-yard outburst against SW Missouri, it was McLean leading Benjamin as the top backs in the Big West.

Oregon will prove to have been UNLV's toughest opponent, but Pacific will be the Rebs first Big West test to prove their legitimate contenders for this

year's Big West crown. The Tigers know they are legitimate contenders but they can't afford another Big West defeat after dropping their opener at Nevada (Reno) two weeks ago.

The game will be carried live over KDWN-AM (720) with Ken Korach and Tony Cordasco calling the action. The broadcast will begin with "Rebel Warm-up" at 1:30p.m. Kickoffis at 2:05p.m.

Randall Cunningham and Herschel Walker are playing well off of each other and it is baffling defenses left and right. Their counterparts, Troy Aikman and Emmit Smith aren't having the same effect, yet the Dallas Duo can be dangerous.
