



AFRICAN-AMERICAN HISTORY

David Ruffin was born Davis Eli Ruffin on January 8, 1941 in Meridian, Mississippi. He was the son of a Baptist preacher who, of course, exposed him to gospel music. His mother



died soon after his birth and he was raised by his father and step-

From the age of six he was encouraged to sing whenever gospel shows came to the city, and at age 14 he went to Memphis. There he spent two years with a gospel group called the Dixie Nightingales. From Memphis he traveled to Arkansas where he spent a brief time as a racehorse jockey. He soon set out for Detroit in search of work, as a drummer. Gwen Gordy introduced him to her brother Barry Gordy and so it all began.


The following year Ruffin gave the group The Temptations their first hit single, "The Way You Do The Things You Do." The hit single "My Girl" was recorded in 1965; David sang the lead vocals and "My Girl" was the Temptations first number one hit record.

They were the first male Motown group to have a number one hit record. The next four years produced some of the most enduring hits for the group.

Following "My Girl" came the hits "Its Growing", "Since I Lost My Baby", "Get Ready", and "Ain't Too Proud to Beg".

"Ain't Too Proud to Beg," one of Ruffins best vocal tunes was featured in the 1983 hit movie The Big Chill.
