## C. DELORES TUCKER SUCCEEDS SHIRLEY AS CHAIR OF POLITICAL CONGRESS OF BLACK WOMEN

Washington, D.C. - CNS -Dr. C. Delores Tucker, prominent civil rights and political activist, has been named Chair of the National Political Congress of Black Women, succeeding former Congresswoman Shirley Chisholm who now serves as Chair Emeritus.

Dr. Tucker was Secretary of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and presently serves on the National Trustee Board of the NAACP, as Chair of the Democratic National Committee's Black Caucus. President-Founder of the Bethune-Dubois Fund, and President of the Philadelphia Chapter of the Martin Luther King, Jr. Center for Nonviolent Social Change.

The National Political Congress of Black Women (NPCBW) was founded in 1984, in Washington, D.C., when Dr. Tucker called together a group of black women leaders to discuss the "critical and urgent" need for black women to organize for greater involvement in the political process

Dr. Tucker said the Democratic Convention's failure in 1984 to address crucial issues facing black women and their families and the exclusion of black women leaders from the selection process for Vice President that years provided the call to action.

"Black women from across the nation rallied, recognizing the need to become key participants in the process to achieve parity in politics. Once we organized," Dr. Tucker recalled, we called upon Shirley Chisholm to serve as our Chair. We were most fortunate to have had the benefit of her leadership for the past eight years, during her tenure as Chair, more than 42 chapters were established."

Dr. Tucker announced that Ms. Chisholm and Dr. Gloria E.A. Toote will be honored for their contributions to NPCBW at the organization's 7th Annual Brunch during the Congressional Black Caucus Legislative Weekend on Sunday, September 27, 1992, at the Sheraton Washington Hotel. Dr. Toote, who served as Second Vice President of NPCBW since 1985, was recently appointed by President Bush to the Board of the Federal National Mortgage Association (Fannie Mae).

Dr. Dorothy Height, President of the National Council of Negro Women, is serving as Chair of the Brunch, and Rev. Willie Barrow and the Honorable Jewel Lafontant-Mankarious are serving as Co-Chairs.

NPCBW is a non-partisan, non-profit organization. The primary mission of NPCBW is to promote and encourage the participation of black women in the political process to gain the social, educational and economic empowerment needed to enhance the quality of life for black women, their families and community.

Founding members of the NPCBW include Dr. Dorothy Height, Coretta Scott King, Congresswomen Maxine Waters, Eleanor Holmes Norton, Barbara Rose Collins, and Cardiss Collins, Antoinette Ford, Rev. Willie Barrow, State Senator Gloria Lawlor, Barbara Williams Skinner, Leslie Baskerville. and Dr. Gloria E.A. Toote.
