PRESIDENTIAL C **HEATS UP IN FINAL W**

POLLS INDICATE PRESIDENTIAL RACE MAY BE CLOSER THAN EXPECTED

Governor Bill Clinton's lead over President Bush edged down to 2 points among likely voters, this past week, according to the newest national poll.

The latest USA TODAY/CNN/Gallup poll found Clinton with 40%, Bush with 38% and Perot with 16% of the vote among over 800 likely voters.

Previously, the poll had measured only registered voters, and showed Clinton up by as many as 11 points, but switched to tracking likely voters in order to obtain better accuracy. Likely voters are characterized as those who appear certain to cast ballots, making this method a more realistic picture of the electorate than the general sample of voters who say they are registered, but may not actually vote.

In the crucial state-by-state vote, Clinton still holds the lead in 38 states with 409 electoral votes (only 270 are needed), according to the latest polls.



President Bush immediately took advantage of the good economic news released Tuesday. It was announced that in the last major economic report be-

fore the election, the Commerce Department said the gross domestic product rose to an annual rate of 2.7% in the third quarter. This marked the third straight quarter of growth. However, economists and political analysts wonder if this final bit of good news will be enough to change the minds of some voters next Tuesday.

The third man in the race, Independent candidate Ross Perot, who recently pointed the finger at he Republican Party for plotting against him and his family,

grabbed 16% of the vote amongst likely voters in the poll. Perot had gained steadily on his two opponents through the three debates held earlier in the month, but has leveled off over the past week, and actually dipped slightly among likely voters.

In Nevada, with a 4.4 percentage point margin of error, the last statewide poll taken of 500 registered voters showed Clinton with 40% of the vote. Bush with 30%, Perot with 20%, 5% undecided, and 2% voted 'none of
