Among other subjects, the book looks at Job Corps Contractors and to what extent they deal with teenage suicide, sex and gang related types of illegal

activity.

Author Alfred D. Richards who is known by many for his interest and work with inner city

youths, says he is not advocating whether kids should or should not go to Job Corps but that they should investigate all other lo-

cal, state, private and federal educational programs before taking that step.

The season got under way this month and concludes next spring with playoff and champi-

onship games. Varsity Quiz airs at 7:30 p.m. Wednesdays and is rebroadcast at 12:30 p.m. Mondays on Channel 10, KLVX.

"We want to provide an outlet and recognition for students who have high academic talents and skills," says Bob Ambalad, eighth-grade world geography teacher at Greenspun Junior

Higher School and Varsity Quiz television moderator. "It's always a thrill to watch the students display their knowledge in a pressure situation."

Varsity Quiz, Ambalad adds, "is a game of quick recall of a wide range of information and knowledge" patterned after the original College Bowl.

Students must answer questions in a variety of subject areas, such as geography, history, literature, math, science, spelling and current events. Most of the questions are designed around the junior high school curriculum. For example, students might be asked to name
