

'Sheet' Pumpkin Pie For A Crowd



A true dessert lover always saves room for dessert, especially during holidays and celebrations when a crowd is the order of the day for most. For many, a crowd means spending long hours in the kitchen. Help is here. This easy version of America's favorite holiday pie turns dessert making for a crowd into a breeze. LIBBY'S Famous Pumpkin Pie for a Crowd is 'sheet' pie with all the flavor, richness and smooth traditional round pie. To serve, cut into squares and top with your favorite pie topping.

- 2 teaspoons ground cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon ground ginger
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cloves
- 3 cups (two 12-ounce cans) undiluted CARNATION Evaporated Milk
- Vanilla yogurt or whipped cream for garnish (optional)

Lay two 9-inch pastry rounds into 13 x 9 x 2-inch baking dish, overlapping at center of dish, trim overlapping dough from 9-inch sides of dish; use trimmings to fill spaces. Trim dough even with edges of dish; press edges all around with tines of fork. In large bowl, combine eggs, pumpkin, sugar, salt, cinnamon, ginger, cloves, and evaporated milk. Pour into pie shell. Bake in preheated 425°F. oven for 15 minutes. Reduce temperature to 350°F. Bake an additional 50 to 60 minutes or until knife inserted near center comes out clean. Cool before cutting. Garnish with dollop of vanilla yogurt or whipped cream, if desired.

- Pastry for double-crust 9-inch pie
- 4 eggs, lightly beaten
